**Dominique Naccarato,** a Masters in Environmental Management (MEM) candidate graduating in May, is from rural Chaffee County, Colorado. She works at the Greater Arkansas River Nature Association (GARNA). where she began as an Americarps Volunteer in Service to America (VISTA). Dominique secured enough funding in her VISTA position to stay on as a Program Coordinator and the second employee of GARNA, and has since become the Development Director in charge of a recently hired third employee. After high school, Dominique left the small town of Salida to travel the states and the world, even taking advantage of her Canadian citizenship to live north of Montreal for a time, but ended up returning to her hometown to find many changes taking place, mostly good. Her MEM project, Transit Collective for the Upper Arkansas (T4U), aims to capitalize on these changes and focuses on the Upper Arkansas Valley's need for a regional approach to a transportation system. The project, sponsored by the Chaffee County Economic Development Corporation, has engaged over 40 different stakeholders from four counties, including business owners, managers and government officials, many of whom convened for a Transit Summit last November. The project recently had an audience with Luis Benitez, Colorado's Director of the Outdoor Recreation Industry Office, through a meeting of the Regional Tourism Sector Partnership. So far, the project has resulted in a rekindling of the county Transportation Advisory Board, with more to come.

Weed Related Potential MEM Project Idea: The Town of Crested Butte is in the process of forming a weed committee to address noxious weeds in the Town of CB. From a "hard" science perspective, this presents an interesting opportunity for the graduate student to establish a baseline in 2016 and monitor our weed treatments or even set up an experiment to evaluate different approaches to weed management and monitor the effectiveness of these over time. One site that is particularly interesting and weed infested is the CB Cemetery at 10,000 feet. From a social science perspective, there is an interesting opportunity to study people's opinions on weeds, their treatment, and the best way to ensure community buy-in for weed management in a rural town.
