Honors 397 or BUAD 397 or ENVS 397 Iceland: Exploring Ice land's Environment and Impacts on Society May 11th-May 26th, Join Dr. Sally Hays on a 16 day exploration of the land and culture of Iceland. The class will focus on how the environment of a small, isolated island in the middle of the North Atlantic ocean has shaped and been integrated into the culture, language, economy, and society of Iceland. This interdisciplinary course will spend 4 days in Reykjavik (the northern most capital in the world), 4 days along the southern coast (renewable energy and waterfalls) and 7 days in west Iceland (land of the sagas, Viking settlements).
