Father was hired to dismatle mill in Bear Creek Canyon. Cleona and brothers rode horse and a mule down Bear Creek Canyon to school. Memories of the Cornet Creek Flood in 1914.

96-200 Cleona's aunt and uncle lived in a house that was boled to the side of a cliff in Bear Creek canyon. Cleona and cousins coasted on sleds all the way to town. Story of being caught between slow slides on way to school. Recites story of meeting husband and their wedding.

200-268 Speaks of the many activities in school. She belonged to the ukulele club. She graduated in class of 1924, and has kept in touch with former classmates. Talks about her life after her marriage.

 History and birthdates of Harold's family. Parents were married in Montrose. Harold's father was best mill-wright the mining industry ever had. His son Charles was the person who did the work winding the alternators and building machinery in Illium for L.L. Nunn. His aunt and her husband owned the San Miguel Examiner until 1923. His mother's brother was a pharmacist and worked for Quine Drug Store. Harold was born in 1904 in Trinidad and attended grade school there, but moved to Telluride in 1916 to live with aunt and uncle. Memories of working on construction projects in Utah. After moving to Telluride, he graduated from 4 years of high school in 3 years. Speaks of working on the typewriters in manuel class., later becoming dealer for Remington typewriter. Gives history of his many jobs and businesses bought and sold for several years before joining the navy. Describes stories of navy life.
