| 318-348 | Lavender, Sweeney | Mother shopped in bulk and canned and baked. Farmers peddled produce from Montrose. Names some of the early families in town. Many good people in town. Everyone was friendly. Mother belonged to Community Church and Rebeccah Lodge. |
